FROM OUR ASSOCIATE PRIEST

Dear Friends,

After Morning Prayer at the cathedral earlier this week I had a brief conversation with Fran Bell, an ordinand from this parish known to many of you. She told me that she was wrestling with an essay on St. Paul. I responded by saying that I had been wrestling with St. Paul for the past fifty years! What is true of St. Paul applies to the whole of Scripture. There is never a time when we can say that we understood everything, and if we think we have we will be wrong. The Scriptures speak to us of God and a God we could completely understand would not be God.

In our Lenten study groups, shared with friends from St. Mary Magdalene's, we will be delving more deeply into St. Mark's Gospel (which provides most of our Sunday Gospels this year). We will be doing this with the help of no less a figure than Bishop Rowan Williams, through a series of Holy Week talks he gave in Canterbury Cathedral when he was Archbishop.

Early in his public ministry, Mark tells us of Jesus preaching in the synagogue at Capernaum and his hearers are astounded because, "He taught us as one who had authority, and not as one of their scribes". The scribes were the professional interpreters of the Law and other scriptural texts. A warning there for those who have such a role in the Church.

People sometimes think that it must have been so much easier to believe if we had been there with Jesus, rather than hearing about him two thousand years later. Mark will have none of that. So, when Jesus returns to his home town of Nazareth and is invited to preach in the synagogue, he gets a very different response. The locals, his neighbours who think that they know Jesus, reject someone whom they can dismiss as a mere tradesman, one with none of the theological education which would qualify him to preach; perhaps even illegitimate. Throughout the Gospel opposition to Jesus will grow until it culminates in his passion.

We will also read of incomprehension on the part of his chosen disciples. Mark's portrayal of them is an unflattering one. They usually fail to understand what Jesus is saying. In a way this is strangely reassuring. If even those who had shared his company could misunderstand Jesus, with all their opportunities of close relationship, then it is hardly surprising that we, who do not share that physical immediacy, should be equally slow learners.

This is not to excuse us from the task of trying. We have, as Jesus says in John's Gospel, been given the Spirit who will "lead us into all truth". That will involve a stretching of mind and imagination. We may find it more challenging, disturbing, uncomfortable, than comforting, because God cannot be fitted neatly into our labelled boxes. But the task is worthwhile and deeply rewarding.

WATERAID LENTEN APPEAL - "JARS OF CHANGE"

Solomon answered all her questions; there was nothing hidden from the king that he could not explain to her. When the queen of Sheba had observed all the wisdom of Solomon, the house that he had built, the food of his table, the seating of his officials, and the attendance of his servants, their clothing, his valets, and his burnt-offerings that he offered at the house of the Lord, there was no more spirit in her.

So she said to the king, 'The report was true that I heard in my own land of your accomplishments and of your wisdom, but I did not believe the reports until I came and my own eyes had seen it. Not even half had been told me; your wisdom and prosperity far surpass the report that I had heard. Happy are your wives! Then she gave the king one hundred and twenty talents of gold, a great quantity of spices, and precious stones; never again did spices come in such quantity as that which the queen of Sheba gave to King Solomon.

GOSPEL READING

MARK 7:14-23

Then Jesus called the crowd again and said to them, 'Listen to me, all of you, and understand: there is nothing outside a person that by going in can defile, but the things that come out are what defile.' When he had left the crowd and entered the house, his disciples asked him about the parable. He said to them, 'Then do you also fail to understand? Do you not see that whatever goes into a person from outside cannot defile, since it enters, not the heart but the stomach, and goes out into the sewer?' (Thus he declared all foods clean.) And he said, 'It is what comes out of a person that defiles. For it is from within, from the human heart, that evil intentions come: fornication, theft, murder, adultery, avarice, wickedness, deceit, licentiousness, envy, slander, pride, folly. All these evil things come from within, and they defile a person.'
