FROM OUR ASSOCIATE PRIEST

Dear Friends,

In Sunday's reading from the Acts we hear of the extension of Paul's and the Church's mission from Asia to Europe, after his vision of a man saying, "Come over to Macedonia and help us." That mission began in the city of Philippi and Luke reports that on the Sabbath day they met and spoke with a group of women who had gathered at a place of prayer outside the city. The group included a woman named Lydia, a dealer in purple cloth (the luxury end of the rag trade in those days). She was a "worshipper of God," that is, someone who had been drawn to the Jewish religion. So receptive was she to Paul's message that she and her household were baptized and she invited the missionary party to stay at her home.

On Thursday of this week, the site of the old church of St. Paul in the Bail - probably the oldest site of Christian worship in Lincoln, - will once more be an outdoor place of prayer, as with our friends from St. Mary Magdalene's and the Cathedral, we celebrate Ascension Day. I'm sorry that a half-term visit to granddaughters means that I will not be available to act as Master of Ceremonies and thurifer. I shall have to find somewhere else to go to church on Ascension Day.

There are types of outdoor religion which are more off-putting than attractive: usually conducted through a loudhailer and threatening people with hellfire and damnation. For some years a man called Phil patrolled the area around Oxford Circus urging the crowds: "Don't be a sinner, be a winner." I never once saw him actually engage anyone in conversation about the gospel. Local workers and residents, who had to endure this monotonous message day after day, were relieved when the council took out an order excluding him from the area.

Phil and his ilk were one of the reasons which prompted us to begin having outdoor processions around our parish, taking in a stretch of Oxford Street; on Palm Sunday, Corpus Christi and the Feast of the Assumption on August 15. Together with a brass band to support our hymn-singing – not easy with a long procession moving around corners, and competing the din of traffic. On summer evenings, we made way through crowds of shoppers, drinkers standing outside pubs, diners sitting at restaurant tables. We harangued no one, smiled at people and greeted them - and handed out leaflets explaining that we were the parish church and telling them about our projects for the homeless. Some looked bemused, others fell to their knees, and some even joined us and became our guests at the post-service party in the church courtyard. We hoped that people would see in this outdoor worship a joyful expression of the Christian faith, rather than a high volume verbal battering, and a demonstration that, contrary to rumour, the Church is not dead.

And the city has no need of sun or moon to shine on it, for the glory of God is its light, and its lamp is the Lamb. And there will be no more night; they need no light of lamp or sun, for the Lord God will be their light, and they will reign for ever and ever.

GOSPEL READING

JOHN 14:23-29

Jesus said to his disciples, 'Those who love me will keep my word, and my Father will love them, and we will come to them and make our home with them. Whoever does not love me does not keep my words; and the word that you hear is not mine, but is from the Father who sent me.

'I have said these things to you while I am still with you. But the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything, and remind you of all that I have said to you. Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled, and do not let them be afraid. You heard me say to you, "I am going away, and I am coming to you." If you loved me, you would rejoice that I am going to the Father, because the Father is greater than I. And now I have told you this before it occurs, so that when it does occur, you may believe.'

FIRST READING

ACTS 17:15, 22-18:1

Those who conducted Paul brought him as far as Athens; and after receiving instructions to have Silas and Timothy join him as soon as possible, they left him. Then Paul stood in front of the Areopagus and said, 'Athenians, I see how extremely religious you are in every way. For as I went through the city and looked carefully at the objects of your worship, I found among them an altar with the inscription, "To an unknown god." What therefore you worship as unknown, this I proclaim to you. The God who made the world and everything in it, he who is Lord of heaven and earth, does not live in shrines made by human hands, nor is he served by human hands, as though he needed anything, since he himself gives to all mortals life and breath and all things. From one ancestor he made all nations to inhabit the whole earth, and he allotted the times of their existence and the boundaries of the places where they would live, so that they would search for God and perhaps grope for him and find him—though indeed he is not far from each one of us. For "In him we live and move and have our being"; as even some of your own poets have said,

"For we too are his offspring."

Since we are God's offspring, we ought not to think that the deity is like gold, or silver, or stone, an image formed by the art and imagination of mortals. While God has overlooked the times of human ignorance, now he commands all people everywhere to repent, because he has fixed a day on which he will have the world judged in righteousness by a man whom he has appointed, and of this he has given assurance to all by raising him from the dead.' When they heard of the resurrection of the dead, some scoffed; but others said, 'We will hear you again about this.' At that point Paul left them. But some of them joined him and became believers, including Dionysius the Areopagite and a woman named Damaris, and others with them.

After this Paul left Athens and went to Corinth.
