FROM OUR ASSOCIATE PRIEST

Dear Friends,

My brother married a girl from Wales and there they have made their home. They are faithful members of the Church in Wales, and it has been my privilege to minister in it when visiting them, so I follow its affairs with interest.

Like the Diocese of Lincoln, the Welsh church has a large number of medieval churches, often in places where few people now live, and even fewer go to church. Unlike many of those Welsh non-conformist chapels, with wonderful Old Testament names, they cannot easily be re-purposed as arts or community centres, or carpet showrooms. Like us, too, the Welsh Church is facing a shortage of clergy and of money. Some time before we embarked on Time To Change Together, the Church in Wales began a programme of consolidating parishes in mission and ministry areas.

One of the most acute commentators on this process and its theological underpinning, or lack of it, is an American priest, Fr. Mark Clavier, who has also made his home in Wales and its Church. As our situation in this diocese has many similarities, much of what he says might profit us. In one of his most recent pieces, he took up an idea he had heard from the former prime minister of New Zealand, Jacinda Ahearn. She spoke of another prime minister" summary of what voters want: "Someone to love, somewhere to live, somewhere to work, and something to hope for."

Canon Clavier has adapted these four points to look at what people seek in a church. He suggests:

- a place to belong;
- a way to worship;
- a truth to live by;
- a hope to carry.

Each of these "arks of the church" captures something essential about what the Church is, and what it offers. There is no space in one letter to do them all justice, so I will take one a week over the next month.

"A Place to Belong" is a spiritual home, one rooted in tradition, where people are known, welcomed and loved. Few people come to church because they are convinced by an intellectual argument or doctrine, but because they want to feel at home, not just for comfort, but to know and be known. Belonging in the Church is about something much deeper than being sociable or clubbable. The things which join us to one another are not preference or personality, but the gifts of faith and baptism. Churches are not just for "eople like us."It has been said, by Archbishop Rowan, if I remember rightly, that churches are one of the few places these days where we encounter people who are not like us. A hospitality which mirrors that of Jesus himself, makes room for folk, regardless of their pasts and backgrounds, their age, race, gender or sexuality. It even seeks to make room for the difficult and challenging.

In the North of England, where I grew up, we often spoke of someone as "elonging" the village they came from: so I still "elonged" Ingleton long after I had left home. This sense of belonging to a place is reflected in the parish system of the Church of England, where everyone who lives in a parish "elongs" to it; is its responsibility. We see that perhaps most clearly in those who in significant numbers still turn to us for baptisms, weddings and funerals. There has to be room and a welcome for them, too.

Clavier points out that the word "elonging" comes from an old English word meaning "o go along with." Most people look for companions who will walk the pilgrimage of life with them: spouses, partners, friends, colleagues. The Church sees the destination of that journey, the horizon to which we travel, as God and heaven; and local Christian communities as providing that companionship, that belonging, the support we all need.

That belonging together does not just happen in a church, anymore than it does in a marriage. Even those who fall in love at first sight soon learn that they will need to cultivate the habits and virtues which will sustain a relationship over a lifetime. Belonging has to be nurtured. This is about more than attending services, although that is essential. It involves forming friendships, simple things like remembering names and faces, noticing how people are and when they are not there, bearing one another's burdens, in times of sickness and sorrow, and celebrating joys together. As I visit the sick and the housebound, it is cheering to hear how often fellow-parishioners are in touch with them. We are not starting from scratch.
