### FROM OUR ASSOCIATE PRIEST

Dear Friends,

Our study groups on the Nicene Creed, in this 1700th anniversary year, are drawing to a close, and I know from what some have said that I am not the only person who has profited from them. I have often found that one of the best ways of learning a subject is to have to teach it. This is true both of the preparation and of the interchange of ideas and questions with others. The same is true of the experience of preaching and of writing; things I do several times a week, with homilies at the Eucharist and columns like this one. They, too are learning experiences in both preparation and in conversation with those who respond to them.

One of the things that has been apparent in our weeks together engaging with the Nicene Creed is that Christian doctrine is not abstract and intellectual. While it does make use of human philosophy (itself, of course, a product of the human reason which is a divine gift), it could hardly be merely impersonal when it is concerned with the persons of Father, Son and Holy Spirit in themselves, and in relation to human beings, who are themselves made in the image and likeness of God. So what we believe about God, and our relationship with the divine, has direct and immediate relevance to the way we live our lives in relationship with our fellow-human beings, and the creation of which we are part.

This year also sees the 250th anniversary of the birth of Jane Austen. As a minor part of the many celebrations of this, I was invited to give a talk on Jane Austen and religion to a group at the Morning Star pub, a couple of weeks ago. My fellow-speaker, who concentrated on 'Pride and Prejudice,' the universal favourite among her novels, lamented the current trend to turn her novels into 'Rom Coms', when her purpose is much more serious than that.

I concentrated on her least popular novel, 'Mansfield Park' and its heroine Fanny Price, who lacks the sparkling wit of Lizzie Bennet, but is the moral centre of the novel whose quiet but firm influence rescues the household of Mansfield Park from a ruin brought on by immorality and disregard for the place of religion in the fabric of a community.

I began my talk by pointing out that several of the TV programmes made to mark this anniversary mentioned that her father was a clergyman, the Rector of a parish in Hampshire, and that he encouraged her extensive reading in his library, and her writing. But after that, her religious belief and practice, as a devout member of the Church of England, was considered irrelevant to her writing.

Jane Austen does not wear her faith on her sleeve in her novels. Unlike her contemporary, the evangelical Hannah More, who wrote a deservedly forgotten novel intended to bring about a conversion experience, she 'told it slant,' as the American poet Emily Dickinson put it. Hers was the restrained and undemonstrative Anglicanism of the time. Formed by the worship of the Prayer Book and the Scriptures, not just in Church on Sundays but also at home, it held that true religion was demonstrated in the practice of the virtues and duties appropriate to one's station in life. Her characters, including the clerical ones, are all judged by this standard.

Afterwards there was a lively discussion in which a couple of my audience seemed unwilling to countenance the idea that what Jane Austen believed might have any influence on her writings. Her faith was a private matter, while her public writings were a separate, professional area of her life. I wonder whether they would say the same of an author who is an atheist; or is it just Christianity which is denied a place in public debate and literary life?

### **SECOND READING**

He himself is before all things, and in him all things hold together. He is the head of the body, the church; he is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead, so that he might come to have first place in everything. For in him all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, and through him God was pleased to reconcile to himself all things, whether on earth or in heaven, by making peace through the blood of his cross.

And you who were once estranged and hostile in mind, doing evil deeds, he has now reconciled in his fleshly body through death, so as to present you holy and blameless and irreproachable before him—provided that you continue securely established and steadfast in the faith, without shifting from the hope promised by the gospel that you heard, which has been proclaimed to every creature under heaven. I, Paul, became a servant of this gospel.

I am now rejoicing in my sufferings for your sake, and in my flesh I am completing what is lacking in Christ's afflictions for the sake of his body, that is, the church. I became its servant according to God's commission that was given to me for you, to make the word of God fully known, the mystery that has been hidden throughout the ages and generations but has now been revealed to his saints. To them God chose to make known how great among the Gentiles are the riches of the glory of this mystery, which is Christ in you, the hope of glory. It is he whom we proclaim, warning everyone and teaching everyone in all wisdom, so that we may present everyone mature in Christ.

**LUKE 10:38-END** 

Now as Jesus and his disciples went on their way, he entered a certain village, where a woman named Martha welcomed him into her home. She had a sister named Mary, who sat at the Lord's feet and listened to what he was saying. But Martha was distracted by her many tasks; so she came to him and asked, 'Lord, do you not care that my sister has left me to do all the work by myself? Tell her then to help me.' ### **FIRST READING**

EXODUS 16:1-5, 9-15

The whole congregation of the Israelites set out from Elim; and Israel came to the wilderness of Sin, which is between Elim and Sinai, on the fifteenth day of the second month after they had departed from the land of Egypt. The whole congregation of the Israelites complained against Moses and Aaron in the wilderness. The Israelites said to them, 'If only we had died by the hand of the Lord in the land of Egypt, when we sat by the fleshpots and ate our fill of bread; for you have brought us out into this wilderness to kill this whole assembly with hunger.'

Then the Lord said to Moses, 'I am going to rain bread from heaven for you, and each day the people shall go out and gather enough for that day. In that way I will test them, whether they will follow my instruction or not. On the sixth day, when they prepare what they bring in, it will be twice as much as they gather on other days.'

Then Moses said to Aaron, 'Say to the whole congregation of the Israelites, "Draw near to the Lord, for he has heard your complaining." And as Aaron spoke to the whole congregation of the Israelites, they looked towards the wilderness, and the glory of the Lord appeared in the cloud. The Lord spoke to Moses and said, 'I have heard the complaining of the Israelites; say to them, "At twilight you shall eat meat, and in the morning you shall have your fill of bread; then you shall know that I am the Lord your God."" In the evening quails came up and covered the camp; and in the morning there was a layer of dew around the camp. When the layer of dew lifted, there on the surface of the wilderness was a fine flaky substance, as fine as frost on the ground. When the Israelites saw it, they said to one another, 'What is it?' For they did not know what it was. Moses said to them, 'It is the bread that the Lord has given you to eat.'

### **PSALM**

PSALM 78:17-31

Refrain: The Lord gave them manna from heaven.

Yet for all this they sinned more against him and defied the Most High in the wilderness.

They tested God in their hearts

and demanded food for their craving.

They spoke against God and said,

'Can God prepare a table in the wilderness?

'He struck the rock indeed, so that the waters gushed out

and the streams overflowed,

but can he give bread or provide meat for his people?' **R** 

When the Lord heard this, he was full of wrath; a fire was kindled against Jacob

and his anger went out against Israel,

So he commanded the clouds above and opened the doors of heaven.

He rained down upon them manna to eat and gave them the grain of heaven.

So mortals ate the bread of angels;

he sent them food in plenty. R

He caused the east wind to blow in the heavens and led out the south wind by his might.

He rained flesh upon them as thick as dust and winged fowl like the sand of the sea.

He let it fall in the midst of their camp and round about their tents.

So they ate and were well filled, for he gave them what they desired.

But they did not stop their craving; their food was still in their mouths,

When the anger of God rose against them, and slew their strongest men and felled the flower of Israel. *R* 

# **GOSPEL READING**

MATTHEW 13:1-9

Jesus went out of the house and sat beside the lake. Such great crowds gathered around him that he got into a boat and sat there, while the whole crowd stood on the beach. And he told them many things in parables, saying: 'Listen! A sower went out to sow. And as he sowed, some seeds fell on the path, and the birds came and ate them up. Other seeds fell on rocky ground, where they did not have much soil, and they sprang up quickly, since they had no depth of soil. But when the sun rose, they were scorched; and since they had no root, they withered away. Other seeds fell among thorns, and the thorns grew up and choked them. Other seeds fell on good soil and brought forth grain, some a hundredfold, some sixty, some thirty. Let anyone with ears listen!'
