FROM OUR ASSOCIATE PRIEST

Dear Friends,

Sunday's epistle is a passage from the First Letter to Timothy, one of three known as the 'Pastoral Epistles,' written to guide leaders and teachers of churches set in the midst of a largely non-Christian, and sometimes hostile, environment. The letters stress the importance in that situation of the conduct and example of the community; and within the life of congregations that of their leaders.

A notable feature of life in New Testament times, and increasingly again in ours, is the huge gap between the rich and poor. In his first long interview since his election, one of the issues which Pope Leo has expressed concern over is the ever-widening gap between the pay of chief executives and that of ordinary workers; the increasing concentration of wealth in the hands of a tiny minority.

So what the epistle has to say about wealth, echoing the teaching of Jesus himself, remains strikingly relevant: the love of money as the root of all evil, the temptations besetting those who are rich, or want to be; the reminder that "we brought nothing into the world, so that we can take nothing out of it;" words which may well be read as our bodies are brought into church for our funerals.

In contrast, "there is great gain in godliness combined with contentment...if we have food and clothing we will be content with these." Well, most of us need rather more things than that, we cannot all be St. Francis, and many of them are not bad in themselves, but scripture and Christian spiritual tradition remind us that we need to keep possessions in proportion lest they come to possess us.

Part of this passage was the epistle last Thursday when I was celebrating the early Eucharist at the Cathedral. My homily was largely on the gospel reading about the women who accompanied Jesus during his ministry and supported him out of their means, who would be present at his death and burial, and then be the first witnesses of his resurrection, so I only referred to the epistle briefly.

It isn't a service at which I expect to encounter members of the super-rich in the congregation, but you never know, and a man whom I had never seen before asked me after the service where he could find the passage, because he was a wealthy man and needed to read it again.

None of us, I'm sure, would consider ourselves to be wealthy on anything like the scale of Silicon Valley techbillionaires with their incomes and assets so huge that it is difficult to imagine what more they could possibly need to buy to improve their lives materially. However, in comparison with the people we see on our television screens in Gaza or Sudan, who have almost nothing, we are comfortably secure.

So the epistle's advice which points those who are rich to a spiritual wealth that endures, urging them to "do

good, to be rich in good works, generous and ready to share, thus storing up for themselves the treasure of a good foundation for the future, so that they may take hold of the life that really is life," applies to us all.

For the love of money is a root of all kinds of evil, and in their eagerness to be rich some have wandered away from the faith and pierced themselves with many pains. But as for you, man of God, shun all this; pursue righteousness, godliness, faith, love, endurance, gentleness. Fight the good fight of the faith; take hold of the eternal life, to which you were called and for which you made the good confession in the presence of many witnesses. In the presence of God, who gives life to all things, and of Christ Jesus, who in his testimony before Pontius Pilate made the good confession, I charge you to keep the commandment without spot or blame until the manifestation of our Lord Jesus Christ, which he will bring about at the right time—he who is the blessed and only Sovereign, the King of kings and Lord of lords. It is he alone who has immortality and dwells in unapproachable light, whom no one has ever seen or can see; to him be honour and eternal dominion. Amen.

As for those who in the present age are rich, command them not to be haughty, or to set their hopes on the uncertainty of riches, but rather on God who richly provides us with everything for our enjoyment. They are to do good, to be rich in good works, generous, and ready to share, thus storing up for themselves the treasure of a good foundation for the future, so that they may take hold of the life that really is life.

GOSPEL READING

LUKE 16:19-END

Jesus told this parable to those among the Pharisees who loved money:

'There was a rich man who was dressed in purple and fine linen and who feasted sumptuously every day. And at his gate lay a poor man named Lazarus, covered with sores, who longed to satisfy his hunger with what fell from the rich man's table; even the dogs would come and lick his sores. The poor man died and was carried away by the angels to be with Abraham. The rich man also died and was buried. In Hades, where he was being tormented, he looked up and saw Abraham far away with Lazarus by his side. He called out, "Father Abraham, have mercy on me, and send Lazarus to dip the tip of his finger in water and cool my tongue; for I am in agony in these flames." But Abraham said, "Child,

remember that during your lifetime you received your good things, and Lazarus in like manner evil things; but now he is comforted here, and you are in agony. Besides all this, between you and us a great chasm has been fixed, so that those who might want to pass from here to you cannot do so, and no one can cross from there to us." He said, "Then, father, I beg you to send him to my father's house—for I have five brothers that he may warn them, so that they will not also come into this place of torment." Abraham replied, "They have Moses and the prophets; they should listen to them." He said, "No, father Abraham; but if someone goes to them from the dead, they will repent." He said to him, "If they do not listen to Moses and the prophets, neither will they be convinced even if someone rises from the dead."'

letter to Asaph, the keeper of the king's forest, directing him to give me timber to make beams for the gates of the temple fortress, and for the wall of the city, and for the house that I shall occupy.' And the king granted me what I asked, for the gracious hand of my God was upon me.

But he said, 'Lord, first let me go and bury my father.' But Jesus said to him, 'Let the dead bury their own dead; but as for you, go and proclaim the kingdom of God.' Another said, 'I will follow you, Lord; but let me first say farewell to those at my home.' Jesus said to him, 'No one who puts a hand to the plough and looks back is fit for the kingdom of God.'
