FROM OUR ASSOCIATE PRIEST

Dear Friends,

"Alleluia is our song."

One of my tasks over the time we have not had a parish priest has been to choose the hymns we sing. Like other aspects of my caretaker role, it was one for which I had been prepared by years of practice, as I had been doing it for over forty years. It is also one I do not regard as just another chore to be done as quickly as possible, but one calling for careful attention. This is so because hymns are not just fillers to keep the congregation busy while more important things are being prepared or performed, but an important element of worship in their own right, as well as in combination with the prayers and readings of the liturgy; reflecting and informing what we hear and do in worship.

So, it was especially fitting that, as I come to the end of my stand-in role, one of my last tasks was to arrange last Sunday's afternoon of singing to launch David Mowbray's new collection of hymns, "Alleluia is our Song." David introduced each of his selection, speaking of their subjects – which ranged from the central doctrines of the faith to events like the Steam Punk Festival – and the occasions for writing them such as the 17th centenary of the Nicene Creed the Church has been celebrating this year.

The subtitle of the collection speaks of them as not just for singing but for reflection, and one of them, on Auschwitz, that place which embodies "man's inhumanity to man," was not sung but instead read beautifully for us by Su Toogood. Great hymnody, with words carefully and skilfully crafted, rooted in scripture, faith and deep spiritual experience, and linked with memorable and singable tunes, does provide us with material for prayer and a means of praying. St. Augustine of Hippo, the great African bishop and theologian, from whose "We are the Easter people, and Alleluia is our song," David borrowed his title, also wrote that those "who sing pray twice."

I have often noticed that the scriptures the Church gives us to read in worship often give us words that speak to our situation. The last day of my ministry at Old St. Paul's in Edinburgh was the feast of St. Peter and St. Paul, and the epistle at the Eucharist included Paul's saying to Timothy: "The hour of my departure is at hand." That same passage was the epistle last Sunday, and this Sunday is the last before Mother Hannah's institution and induction on Thursday. Now, I am not going to disappear entirely, but while I have not been the "Vicar" of St. Nick's, I have been your acting parish priest for a considerable period; much longer than any of us anticipated. New incumbents do not usually have to deal with their predecessors still being around while they find their feet in a parish. I have said to Mother Hannah that I will be around to help if needed, and I'm already covering a Wednesday Eucharist while she is on retreat, but I am planning to

take something of a break to recharge my batteries and explore what 'retirement' might hold.

So this is my final letter as your "Associate Priest." Writing them, preparing sermons and leading study groups, have all been spiritually stimulating to me, and I hope it has been of some help to you in your Christian lives. To borrow words from the Irish comedian Dave Allen: "If you have been, thank you for listening and reading."

SECOND READING

In him you also, when you had heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation, and had believed in him, were marked with the seal of the promised Holy Spirit; this is the pledge of our inheritance towards redemption as God's own people, to the praise of his glory. I have heard of your faith in the Lord Jesus and your love towards all the saints, and for this reason I do not cease to give thanks for you as I remember you in my prayers. I pray that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of glory, may give you a spirit of wisdom and revelation as you come to know him, so that, with the eyes of your heart enlightened, you may know what is the hope to which he has called you, what are the riches of his glorious inheritance among the saints, and what is the immeasurable greatness of his power for us who believe, according to the working of his great power. God put this power to work in Christ when he raised him from the dead and seated him at his right hand in the heavenly places, far above all rule and authority and power and dominion, and above every name that is named, not only in this age but also in the age to come. And he has put all things under his feet and has made him the head over all things for the church, which is his body, the fullness of him who fills all in all.

GOSPEL READING

LUKE 6:20-31

Jesus looked up at his disciples and said:

'Blessed are you who are poor,

for yours is the kingdom of God.

'Blessed are you who are hungry now,

for you will be filled.

'Blessed are you who weep now,

for you will laugh.

'Blessed are you when people hate you, and when they exclude you, revile you, and defame you on account of the Son of Man. Rejoice on that day and leap for joy, for surely your reward is great in heaven; for that is what their ancestors did to the prophets.

'But woe to you who are rich,

for you have received your consolation.

'Woe to you who are full now,

for you will be hungry.

'Woe to you who are laughing now,

for you will mourn and weep.

GOSPEL READING

LUKE 14:25-33

Large crowds were travelling with Jesus; and he turned and said to them, 'Whoever comes to me and does not hate father and mother, wife and children, brothers and sisters, yes, and even life itself, cannot be my disciple. Whoever does not carry the cross and follow me cannot be my disciple. For which of you, intending to build a tower, does not first sit down and estimate the cost, to see whether he has enough to complete it? Otherwise, when he has laid a foundation and is not able to finish, all who see it will begin to ridicule him, saying, "This fellow began to build and was not able to finish." Or what king, going out to wage war against another king, will not sit down first and consider whether he is able with ten thousand to oppose the one who comes against him with twenty thousand? If he cannot, then, while the other is still far away, he sends a delegation and asks for the terms of peace. So therefore, none of you can become my disciple if you do not give up all your possessions.

POST COMMUNION

Lord of heaven, in this eucharist you have brought us near to an innumerable company of angels and to the spirits of the saints made perfect: as in this food of our earthly pilgrimage we have shared their fellowship, so may we come to share their joy in heaven; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen**
