FROM OUR VICAR

Happy New Year!

It may be an odd phrase to hear at the end of November, but it is the first Sunday in the Church Calendar. The Liturgical Year runs from the first Sunday of Advent to the eve of Advent every year.

We are still in the early days of me being Vicar of St Nick's, and I have had the pleasure of meeting many key people individually already, with a few more booked into the diary. I am learning a bit more about St Nick's and I hope you are learning a bit more about the vision and hopes I am bringing to you all.

We enter now a season of anticipation, of watching, waiting. We are going from the Patriarchs to Christ, hearing again the story that led to the birth of Jesus. It is a tough time as Christians to keep Advent free from Christmas — it seems the shops have been anticipating Christmas since September!

But in this season, we remember that there was a time on earth before Jesus; where it was hard for the faithful to know which way to turn. There was no advocate then with God, or at least He hadn't arrived yet.

Advent is a time where I like to remember that we are so blessed to live in a time where Jesus has come, where Jesus has died for us, and is our advocate in heaven. Jesus' birth is the beginning of the story of our redemption – there is a lot of theology to unpick here, and I could write myself round in circles attempting to avoid heresy!

Instead, I invite you to keep this season in hopeful anticipation, reading in our Bibles the stories of those who awaited the Messiah. I also invite you to our Advent Course, beginning this Wednesday after the 9:30am Eucharist, and Thursday at 7:30pm, both held in Church. We can discover more together during this time of anticipation, and wait on the Lord to see where They are calling us.
